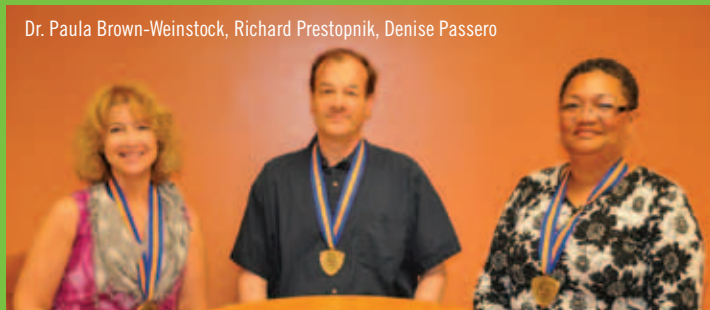
STUDENT RECIPIENTS

Dedication

Associate Professor of Science Laurie Freeman was honored with the Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Hallmark Award. This award is given to a PTK Regional Coordinator for Distinguished Service.

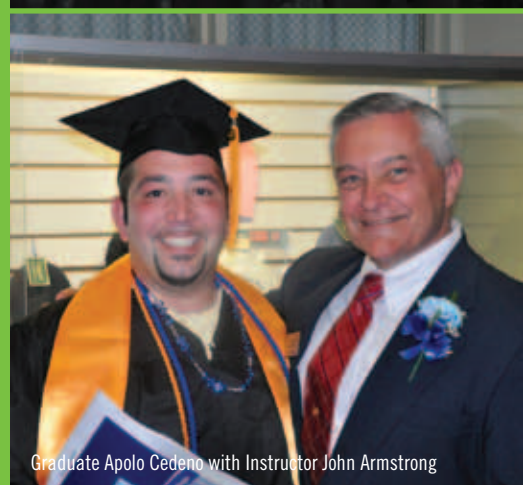
2011 Radiologic Technology graduates boasted a 100% pass rate on the National Registry Examination, ranking in the 97th percentile nationwide.

PTK Academic Awards Ceremony

The evening before commencement, FM hosted its Annual Phi Theta Kappa Awards Ceremony where 68 students received one or more of 85 scholarships and awards.

NYSETA Scholarship

Electrical Technology student Jason Bowers was presented with the New York State Engineering Technology Association Scholarship awarded to a technology student who has demonstrated aptitude and commitment. Jason served as president of the Electrical Technology Club and was an active tutor in the electrical and electronics subject areas.

Engineering Student Excels

Michael Natole, now a graduate of FM's Engineering Science program, was one of 80 community college students selected to travel to the National Community College Aerospace Scholars Program to develop robotic rovers. The program allowed him to spend three days at a NASA center in Pasadena, California.

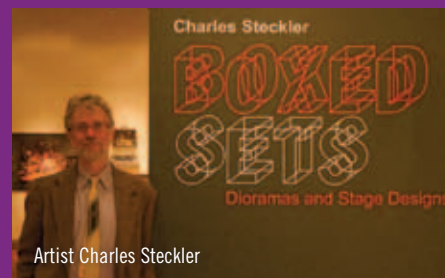

A "Student Athlete 3.0 Luncheon" celebrated student athletes achieving a 3.0 or better during the fall 2010 semester. A total of 28 students reached the goal, 21 of which were named to the Dean's List (3.2 GPA or higher).

FM Student Artists

The Annual Spring Juried Exhibition featured art works created by FM students; marking the culmination of the academic year for student artists. This year's exhibition contained 45 works of art selected from over 125 pieces submitted for judging and featured a broad selection of works created in drawing, painting, three-dimensional design works, photography, and multimedia.

Innovation

New Demonstration Clean Room

FM opened a demonstration clean room at the start of its fall 2010 semester; the only functional clean room at a community college in the region. With GLOBALFOUNDRIES opening in 2012, students who entered FM in fall 2010 will graduate with appropriate educational experiences utilizing clean rooms and automated manufacturing systems.

Preparing Our Students

The PSEM Express Scanning Electron Microscope or SEM, can magnify a sample up to 40,000 times its original size allowing for faculty to teach their students important science and engineering concepts in nanotechnology, semiconductor fabrication, and biology.

Training for the Future

The clean room has seen many visitors since its opening including area school students and teachers. Students learned the protocols for entering a clean room and discussed integrated circuit fabrication. Teachers were invited to various workshops to learn about clean

room construction and operation, the basic fabrication of a computer chip, the manufacturing functions taking place in a chip fab plant, gowning protocol and more. Teachers received, wore, and were able to keep a clean room suit to bring back to their school.

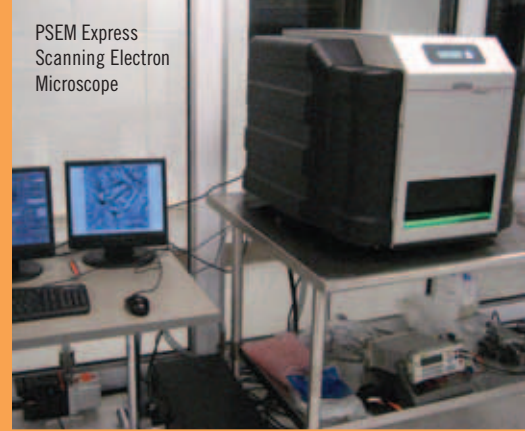
Phantom Patient

With the assistance of FM's Foundation, the Radiologic Technology Program now has a significant teaching tool, the new phantom patient. This phantom represents an average size male and has moveable joints to realistically simulate patient positioning.

Collaborating for the Future

FM was awarded a National Science Foundation (NSF) award for the "Technological Education Pathways Partnership (TEPP)" project with HFM BOCES. TEPP will prepare students for the area's emerging jobs by establishing a technician career pathway program at the 11th and 12th grade levels and vertically aligning that program with two years of community college coursework for students intending to become technicians in the electronic industry.

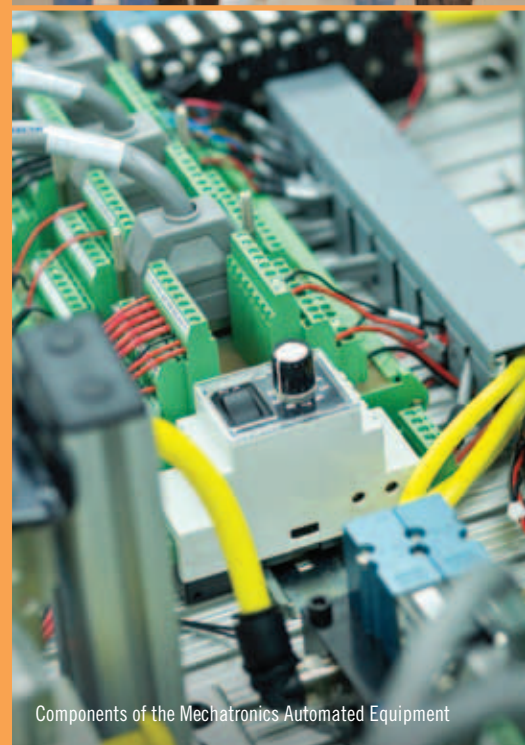

During these tough economic times, FM continues to provide a quality education at an affordable cost. Since 2005, enrollment has increased 33%.

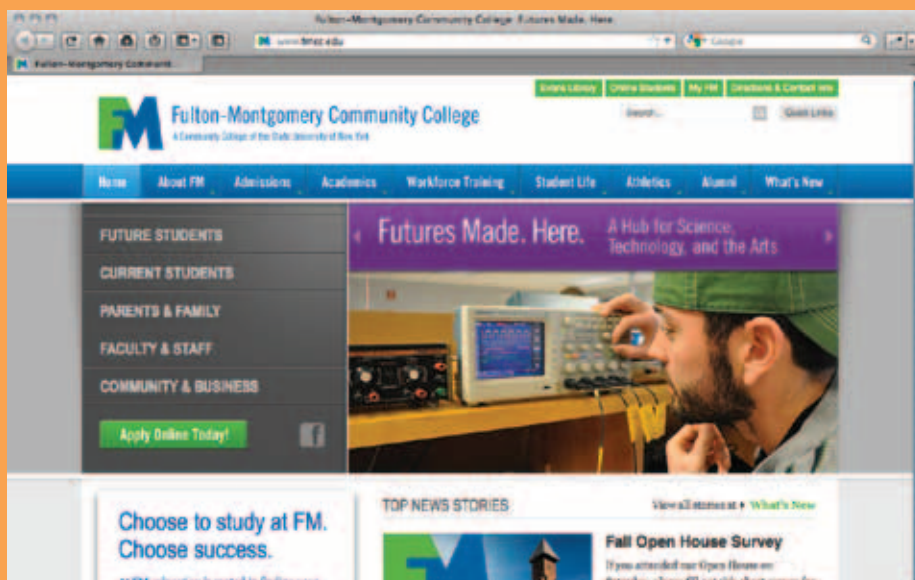
PowerCampus

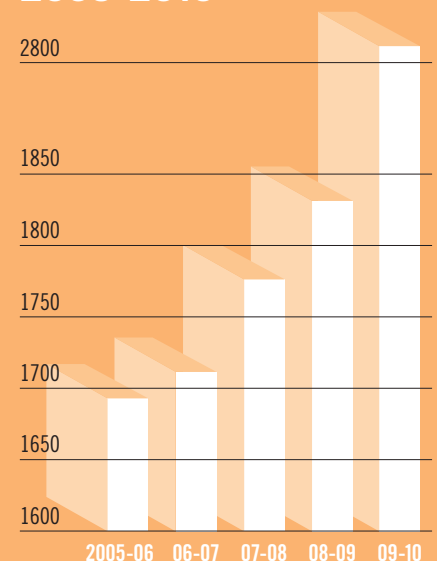

Renovations

The 2010-2011 year saw a great deal of renovations to various FM facilities.

Early in the year, **Books & Bytes Café** opened. The café, located just outside the Evans Library, boasts a coffee house atmosphere providing a unique gathering space for students and faculty.

Campus View Student Housing underwent nearly \$700,000 worth of renovations. Upgrades were made to the sprinkler system, windows, roof, and heating and hot water systems. The 144 suite-style units will double in size as construction to build more units is set for 2012.

A new **FM Raiders Logo** was introduced and can be seen in the Raiders Den where the floors have been stripped and repainted, a new floor-side scoreboard was installed, old wall padding was removed and replaced, and team chairs sporting the new logo are now in place.
